PALMS

Preparation for Lenten Season at Resurrection University Catholic Parish brings a plethora of liturgical changes to the parish. The icons are draped in purple, the Gloria is omitted from the mass, penance and suffering are more often heard than joy and hallelujah. And of course there are the palms.

John 12: 12-14 set the background and history:

"On the next day, when the great crowd that had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they took palm branches and went out to meet him, and cried out "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord."

This evergreen shade-giving plant that thrives where there is little water, seemed a miraculous gift from God to desert-dwelling peoples.

. Thus the palms of the Holy Land were highly valued in the time of Christ and were the consummate symbol of life. Our Palm Sunday Mass draws its theme from the palms, and it has become the most beautiful and bittersweet celebration of the Christian year. We yearn to witness the eternal light of the Resurrection, but Christ's impending suffering and death add an undercurrent of sadness to the ritual blessing of living palms. The fronds, once blessed, are a sacramental to remind us of Christ's sacrifice.

Alastair I. Mackay in his book Farming and Gardening in the Bible noted: "The weary traveler and his equally fatigued camel felt their spirits rise and new vigor strengthen them when the waving palm tops of a distant oasis were sighted; water, food, shade, and perhaps company lay ahead. It was natural that palm branches should become the emblem of welcome, public homage, and journey's end." As we hold our palms in our hands during the blessing at mass on Palm Sunday, may we too become invigorated with a new spirit. May we become emblems of welcome to others, may we pay homage to Christ in our daily walk, and may we be messengers of peace. May we, like those who laid out palm branches for Christ, cry out "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"
